

### History in a Box

This month, phantom cemeteries.



On 2 August 1905 land was dedicated for a cemetery between Burringbar and Mooball, though it was never used for burials. This dedication was revoked on 24 December 1970. On 14 January 1972 part was later used for a 'resting place' on the old Pacific Highway (now Tweed Valley Way). A portion still remains as Crown land.

Similarly, an extension to the Tweed Heads General Cemetery at Cobaki Creek was dedicated on 5 September 1924. It was never used for burials and the dedication was revoked on 28 September 1956.
